
Dear Parents, Caregivers and Friends of our school,

Over the past year we have talked a great deal about the development of the school landscape and playground plan. We have also been fundraising hard and we sincerely thank you for your efforts to support this.

Today, we would like to share with you some photographs, plans and ideas that we have for the new space. It has been over twenty five years since our existing playground area was built so we are well due for a refurbishment.

The new development will include an inclusive play area for pupils with physical disabilities, a new junior playground, a large meeting space named Te Manawa, inclusive of a new shade structure and artificial turf. We would really like to include some seating and a stage area if we have enough funds to do so.

The space will occupy the area where the current junior playground is plus the area where the Phys Ed shed is and the area behind the library. New paths, drainage and gardens will be included.

FREE as are the medicines/treatment options are also covered under the Minor Ailments Service. The Minor Ailments consultation service started on 12th June and will run until 30th September. The aim is to help increase access for people who are unable to access or afford care for minor ailments, and reduce pressures currently faced by hospitals. If anyone meeting the following criteria comes into our pharmacy with any of the below Minor Health Conditions our Pharmacist can have a consultation to advise and offer treatment options.

Minor Ailments criteria

- · Children under 14 years of age
- Whanau members (any age) of a child under 14 years of age with same symptoms
- Community Services Card (CSC) holder
- Māori or Pacific people

- Pain and fever
- Diarrhoea
- Dehydration
- Minor eye infections or inflammation
- Minor skin infections
- Eczema and dermatitis
- Scabies
- Headlice

The following chart you might like to print off and put on your fridge. This has been sent to us by the school's Public Health Nurse. We hope you find this information helpful.

Condition	This disease is spread by	Early Symptoms	Time between exposure and sickness	Exclusion from school early childhood centre or work*
Rashes and skin infections				
Chickenpox	Coughing, sneezing and contact with weeping blisters.	Fever and spots with a blister on top of each spot.	10–21 days after being exposed.	1 week from appearance of rash, or until all blisters have dried.
Hand, foot and mouth disease	Coughing, sneezing, and poor hand washing.	Fever, flu-like symptoms – rash on soles and palms and in the mouth.	3–5 days	Exclude until blisters have dried. If blisters able to be covered, and child feeling well, they will not need to be excluded.
Head lice (Nits)	Direct contact with an infested person's hair, and less commonly by contact with contaminated surfaces and objects.	Itchy scalp, especially behind ears.
